Lions Lose To Oak Harbor

Lion fans were treated to a thriller Friday night as the local eleven showed spark and fire against the Oak Harbor Wildcats. Oak Harbor has been rated the potential champion of the Tri-County tilt, but found its ground attack stymied and all pass receivers well covered.

Both teams were forced by an even match to play defensive ball all night. The break for Oak Harbor came in the last quarter when a series of penalties was called on the Concrete Lions, moving the ball from the Lion 28 yard line to the one foot line. On a quarterback sneak attempt officials ruled that Boury's knee touched the ground behind the goal line, which gave Oak Harbor two points for a safety and the ball game.

Standouts for the Lions were big Mike Keilgas, right tackle, Alan Hurn, stellar guard on the Lion squad, John Livie at guard, fleet-footed Bob Sullivan, who laid down a series of bone-crushing blocks for Tom Boury, ace quarterback for the Lions. Ron Howell, Dave Wahl, Dennis Medford formed the balance of the linesmen whose defensive play helped contain the vaunted Wildcat ground attack. Ron Bates, halfback, stepped into the spot usually held by injured Dick Rathvon, Darrell Pressentin held the other spot in the Lion backfield and proved himself to be developing into a fine quick-break runner.
