Tommy Thompson, Veteran Skagit Ranger, Dies At 85

Thomas Thompson, 85, known only as "Tommy," to his many friends in the Skagit valley, died last Friday, June 6, in the Othello hospital after a few days'

Tommy Thompson was one of the five children of the pioneer Henry Thompson family who set-tled in the Birdsview district in 1891. The family originally was from Maules Mavurn, England, where Thompson was born.

He spent nearly 40 years with the Forest Service, being one of the first to be employed by the Service. He entered the Service on June 6, 1904, spending the first month at Baker Lake and the rest of that summer at New-halem.

Thompson was one of the very anompson was one of the very few who never was required to take a civil service examination for his Forest Service position. He entered the service as a boy when the Forests were handled by the Department of Interior and ore or less "inherited" his posi-

His stations in 1905 and 1906 were at Newhalem and Ruby Creek and at a camp at Hidden Hand Creek. In 1907 he was transferred to the Suiattle-Finney Dis-

quarters were at the Texas Fond Ranger Station and the Suiattle Guard Station where, in 1913, he built the log dwelling still occu-pied by the Suiattle guards. His work on the Suiattle District was principally in the administration of timber sales, fighting fires in the summer and keeping the Suiattle Indians, pacified the year
