LT. KEN SNYDER RECEIVES CITATION FOR VALOR

Lt. Kenneth O. Snyder, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Snyder of Rockport, received his second Army commendation last month performance with his outfit

A member of the 1st Special Forces, widely-known as the Green Berets, Lt. Snyder was a arded the First Oak Leaf Cluster for, according to his citation "meritorious achievement while participating in sustained aerial flight in support of combat ground forces in the Republic of Viet Nam.

distinguished himself on May 19, while serving as a Special Forces advisor to a long-range reconnaissance team:

"The team had been inserted into its area of operation on May 14," reads the details of his citation, "and had been carrying out its assigned mission of gathering information on enemy actiering miorination on enemy activities. Coming across a well-traveled trail, Lt. Snyder made the decision to carry out the secondary portion of his mission, that of attempting a prisoner

"Just as he finished deploying his team for the ambush the point element of an enemy patrol mov-ed into the site and spotted a member of his team. All members of the friendly team set off their deployed claymore mines, killing four enemy soldiers. Lt. Snyder moved swiftly to the edge of the moved swittly to the edge of the trail and was taken suddenly un-der fire by an enemy soldier. Several rounds hit his rucksack, knocking him to the ground, and he was unable to return fire on the enemy soldier.

"Pulling the pin from a grenade Lt. Snyder tossed it over onto the trail, killing the enemy soldier. Realizing the enemy element was numerically superior to his small recon team, he ed the team and began his with drawal . . . and was successful in having the team exfiltrated from the area without a casualty."
