New Barnaby Pond Dedicated

The George Harrison Rearing Pond at Barnaby Slough was de-dicated Sunday in the name of all

sportsmen and conservationists.
Over 100 people heard Clarence Pautkze, former Assistant Secretary of Interior for Fish and Wildlife, laud the late George tharrison of Marysville as a symbol of all men dedicated to preserving game and fish in the Northwest.

Pautkze was a long-time Chief of the Fishery Management Divi-sion for the Washington State Game Department before serving e Department of the Interior.

Mrs. Harrison, widow of the Snohomish sportsmen's leader, accepted the honor in the name of her late husband. The bronze plaque, marking the new rearing pond, reads, "A memorial to George R. Harrison for unrelent ing dedication to the cause of conservation. His wise leadership and foresight were focused on youth and preservation of out-door recreation. His life and work reflect the highest ideals of true sportmanship.

The new addition to the pond complex on the Skagit river near Rockport will be used to rear and summer-run steelhead, and will greatly expand the high-ly successful steelhead rearing program first begun at Barnaby Slough in 1961.

Development of the Harrison

Rearing Pond began with the execution of a long-term use agreement between Scott Paper Co. of Evverett, which owns the land, and the State Game Department.
