## FIRE PERMITS NECESSARY AFTER JULY 1

### Fire Prevention Laws Go Into Effect In National Forests Next Week

Hugh A. Ritter, District Ranger for the U. S. Forest Service at Concrete announced today that effective July 1st camp fire permits would be required by all who camp within the National Forests and pointed out that permits would be issued free at the forest service office here, Koma Kulshan Guard Station on the Baker Lake highway, Baker Lake, Sauk Guard Station and for the convenience of the public, arrangements have been made whereby permits may be obtained at Pressentin's store at Rockport for Mt. Sauk and Illabot Creek territory.

Baker Lake camp grounds is the only designated area in the Baker river district where camp fire permits are not required. Camp fires may be built there without permit.

Parties entering the forests either by auto or with pack stock and who intend to camp at other than designated camp grounds are required to carry a shovel, axe and one gallon water container. This does not apply to anyone who travels on foot or horseback.

Closed areas for which no camp fire permit will be issued due to hazard caused by unburned logging slash are: C. O. Davis Logging operation on the south side of the Skagit River near Hamilton; Lake Shannon Timber Co. operations near Concrete at Thunder Creek; Stimson Mill Co. sale area near Sauk Mountain and also an area north of Baker Lake.

The "No Smoking While Traveling" requirement also becomes effective on July 1. After this date people traveling through forest, brush or grass lands except on a paved or surfaced highway, are expected to refrain from smoking. Smoking may be done at any safe place by stopping.

Cooperation of all the forest-using public is needed to prevent costly and destructive fires.

## SCHOOL HAS NEED FOR BIG AUDITORIUM

An important center of school and community life would be the modern type auditorium featured as part of the long range school building and improvement plan, which will be submitted for approval by the board of directors of the Concrete school district at the special bond and levy election on July 9th.

Virtually a class room in itself, an auditorium stage is in daily use as students carry out the various phases of curricular and extra-curricular activities. It is here that the student assemblies, the many school programs, and the plays for public presentation are prepared and produced. Valuable training in self confidence, cooperation and poise are the important factors which these efforts afford tomorrow's citizens, school directors believe.

Concrete's present arrangement of combination auditorium and gymnasium is decidedly unsatisfactory, according to school officials, who explain that there is constant conflict in use of the building. Play practices or rehearsals for music programs cause the interruption of regular physical education classes and in the final week of preparations for a student production, the gym must be entirely closed except to members of the cast. To these problems must be added the requests for use of stage and gymnasium by the grade school.

Advantages to the general public are apparent in a modern type auditorium in such features as good acoustics, comfortable seats and an arrangement of seating to permit a good view of the stage from all parts of the room. This type of auditorium should become a gathering place for the meetings and programs of various civic organizations—a true community center.

It was feared that there might be a slight concussion so he is still under doctor's care today.

## JOE JANISCH BADLY BURNED IN SUNDAY FIRE

### Sudden Flames Threaten To Destroy Odd Fellows Hall And Other Buildings.

Quick action by the local fire department prevented serious results from a fire originating in the one story building occupied by Joe Janisch next to the Odd Fellows Hall and the Stop & Save Store on Sunday. Mr. Janisch, who was asleep in the building when the fire started, escaped but was so badly burned about the head and back that he is now in critical condition in the Sedro-Woolley hospital.

The blaze started from an overheated oil stove about 2:00 in the afternoon. Mr. Janisch reported that he had started the stove and then laid down for a nap. When he awoke the room was suffocating with heat and smoke and the flame seemed to come as an explosion. As he rushed out the door the flames blew out both windows and the door like a torch, burning him badly about the face.

While neighbors got him to a doctor, the fire department arrived and got the flames under control before they could ignite the larger building just a few feet away. The center of the fire seemed to be on the opposite side from the hall and lack of any breeze aided in isolating and extinguishing the fire with only damage to the small building.

After receiving first aid treatment Mr. Janisch spent most of the afternoon around town but in the evening his condition grew worse and he was rushed to the hospital by ambulance. At latest reports he is recovering slowly but is still in serious condition.

## Plant Given Big Order

Superior Portland Cement, Inc. will share a 94 million pound contract for cement for the south Coulee dam, feeder canal, and the Grand Coulee dam pumping plant and other structures, according to information released by the Bureau of Reclamation, in charge of the eastern Washington project.

The huge contract was awarded on June 19th and will be split between the local company and the Lehigh-Chicago Portland Cement Co. at Spokane. Superior's bid of \$360,750.00 drew an order of 125,000 barrels. The Spokane company will furnish 125,000 barrels at a bid of \$362,000.00.

A major portion of the cement used in the construction of the Coulee dam has been furnished by the local plant.
