## MANY ATTEND COUNTY HOOP BANQUET

Over 300 basketball fans, players and coaches were entertained in Mount Vernon Monday night at the annual basketball banquet. Main event of the evening was the presentation of awards to county stars for their work in the most successful season ever experienced.

An all-tournament team picked by county coaches included both Sullivan and Johnson on the first string of eight players.

## GEO. CURNUTT DROWNED IN SKAGIT RIVER

Popular Newhalem Man Is Victim Of Fishing Accident, Second In Week.

The second tragedy on the Skagit river within a week occurred last Saturday afternoon when George Curnutt, 52 year old locomotive engineer for City Light at Newhalem, was drowned while fishing from a boat at Rockport. The accident was almost identical with the one a week before in which Levaughn Robinson of Sedro-Woolley was drowned at Burns' Bar.

Curnutt was fishing from a rowboat near the Rockport ferry and close to the center of the swift stream. Witnesses on shore saw the accident and report that his anchor hooked up on bottom and when he went towards the bow to free it, the water came in, swamping the boat. Before help could reach him, he tried to swim for shore and disappeared under the surface.

Glen Moore and State Game Protector Splane reported that they had shouted to Curnutt to try to prevent the accident but he failed to hear or became excited. They also shouted for him to hold on to the boat until they could get to him but he started for shore.

The sheriff's deputies and others dragged the river all Saturday afternoon and Sunday without results and up to Wednesday the body was still unfound. The river at Rockport and below is swift and full of eddies and cross-currents that make recovery of a body extremely difficult.

Mr. Curnutt was very well known in the upper valley, having a host of friends here and in all the upper communities. He was a member of the local Masonic Club and an active member of the Masonic degree team.

He is survived by his wife and two daughters.

## CONCRETE WINS FOURTH PLACE IN STATE MEET

Lions Defeat LaConner In 50-49 Thriller To Take High Position.

The Concrete high school basketball team came home from the state "B" tournament last week heaped with honors for their fine tournament play—and with a handsome trophy for 4th place in the state competition.

The local team proved to be a favorite of the meet by virtue of two of the most thrilling games played in the four day schedule. When trophies were presented on Saturday evening it was Concrete that got the biggest cheer as co-captains Bob Johnson and Bill Sullivan stepped out to accept the teams' award.

Concrete won 4th place by virtue of a 50 to 49 victory over LaConner on Saturday afternoon. It was a spine chilling game played with a see-saw score. Concrete opened in the lead, LaConner came back to sink the Lion's hopes until the final minutes. Then the score was tied at 47-47, again at 49-49 and with 10 seconds remaining in the game Bill Sullivan drew a free throw and made it without touching the rim. The crowd went wild as the game ticked out the final seconds with both teams scrapping for possession of the ball.

With Johnson closely checked on offense, Larsen took over for 16 points to furnish the needed extra scoring. Sullivan dropped in 22 to set a new prep tournament record of 86 points in four-games. Johnson contributed 7 points, two of which tied the score in the closing minutes. Armstrong added 5.

Landy James accounted for 25 of LaConners points, Fohn made 10, Wilbur S. Kleisath 4 and Nokolby 1. James fouled out in the final quarter.

### Beat Port Townsend

After Thursday night's loss to Naselle 47-43, Concrete came back to win easily over Port Townsend on Friday 51 to 41. Johnson was high man with 22. Sullivan made 16, Armstrong 6, Larsen 4, McLeod and Rathvon 1 each.

### Two On All-Star Team

Concrete placed Sullivan on the all-state team, with Landy James of LaConner as his running mate. Big Bob Johnson, who played fine ball in spite of illness during the opening games, was given a place as center on the second squad.

While Johnson and Sullivan got the plaudits of radio announcers and officials, it was actually Bob Larsen, Dick Armstrong and Don McLeod who did the background work to make them look good. All regulars and reserves did some top-notch ball handling.

Dick Armstrong deserves much credit for his grueling work under the backboard. Bob Larsen can be credited with a big share of the final victory, as well as being the steady influence in all other contests with his cool play. Don McLeod probably handled the ball more than any other Concrete player during the tourney, bringing it down the floor safely hundreds of times so that the forwards could drop it through the hoop. Rathvon was first reserve and made a fine showing by his coolness and drive when sent in to relieve driving regulars. Expect to see a lot of him next year.

So, the basketball season ended in a blaze of glory that saw the team win eight of their last ten games against the best in the district and state. A fine record for the team and an even better one for Coach John Stahl, whose high standards of sportsmanship and coaching ability have won him respect wherever the team appeared.

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
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
