MORE CHANGES IN FORESTRY PERSONNEL

Hicks Of Darrington Goes to Portland, Warren Pressentin Takes Over Suiattle.

Forest Ranger Vernon E. Hicks of the Suiattle Ranger District at Darrington, is being promoted and transferred to a staff position in the Portland office. He will succeed Lawrence Pagter, who retires as timber management forester.

Ranger Hicks is well qualified for the assignment. He graduated from the University of Michigan in 1932 with a degree in Forestry and has had continuous service in forestry work since that time. He came to the Mt. Baker National Forest in 1942 and in 1945 became District Ranger at Darrington.

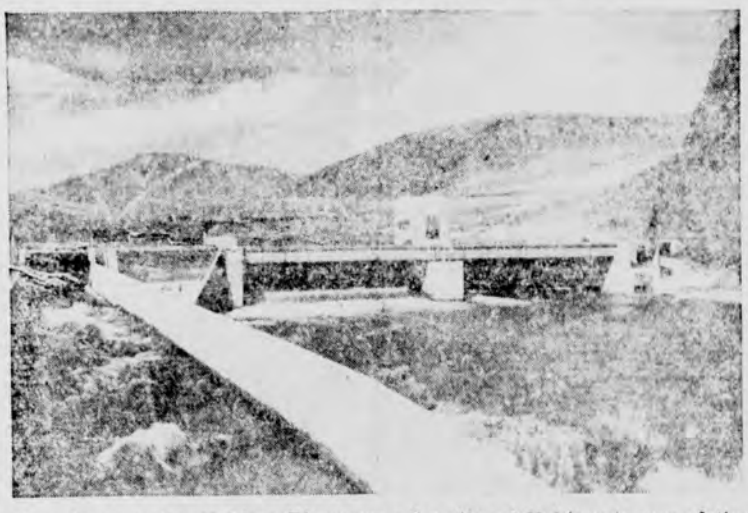
Successor as Suiattle Ranger will be Warren M. Pressentin of Marblemount. He is also a Forestry graduate and went through the usual seasonal jobs as smokechaser, packer, trail foreman on the Skagit district while attending school. He took time off to serve in World War II and then returned to the Mt. Baker Forest as Aerial Fireman-Observer during 1946 and 1947. Since that time he has been timber management assistant on the Rogue River National Forest in southern Oregon.

He is scheduled to arrive at Darrington the latter part of this month.

Pagter Retires

Another forest service change of interest here is the retirement of Lawrence H. Pagter, former supervisor of the Mount Baker Forest. Mr. Pagter retired January 1st from his post as forester in the division of timber management for the Pacific Northwest region. He was married to Mrs. Pagter.

Mr. Pagter was born in 1901 and served in the military during World War I. He has been in the forest service since 1921 and has held various positions throughout the Pacific Northwest.

MORE SNOW AND COLD ADD TO WINTER GRIEF

Heavy Snowfall Followed By Freezing Temperatures As Hard Winter Continues.

Concrete's winter weather has assumed the nature of a continued story. In last week's article we closed with the observation that the citizens were now resignedly awaiting the next blow. They did not have to wait long as about the time the snow began to melt away the weather man let the valley have both barrels.

First a few more inches of snow was added and then the temperature made a sudden drop that caught everyone unawares. Readings as low as 2 degrees above zero were recorded over the week end. Snowfall on the ground before the blizzard today totaled about 16 inches at Concrete and ranged upwards in higher altitudes.

Frozen water pipes, stalled cars and vanishing fuel kept citizens in a worried condition all week. The school failed to open Monday as scheduled and no word has yet been forthcoming as to when they will resume. Frozen water pipes have put both the Rockport and Marblemount schools on the repair list.

On top of all of this the weather bureau predicts more snow and continued cold for several days to come.

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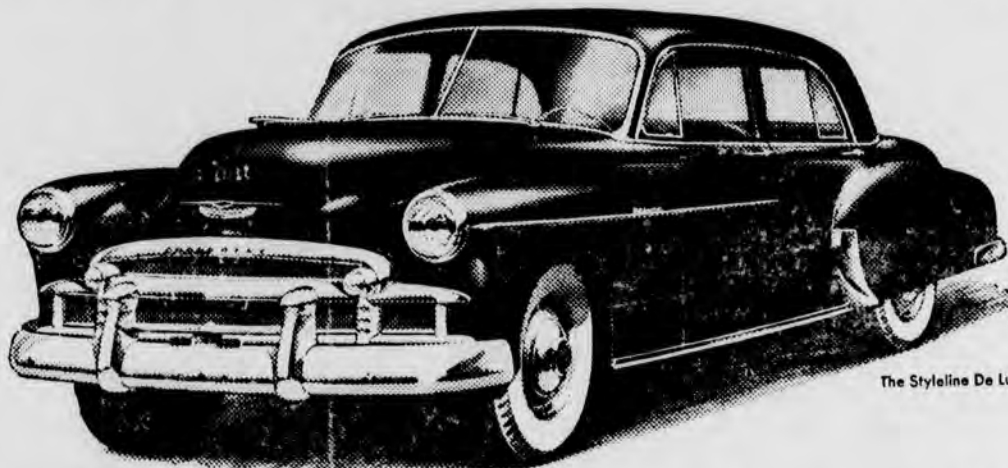
