It is, of course, appreciated that the challenge of the "bigger concept" is not Puget Power's alone. The "Great Cathedral" can only be built through joint action and united effort by all the people who want this area to achieve the destiny ordained for it. The territory served by Puget Power is generously endowed with the basic ingredients for the Richer, Fuller, Better Life. Only a start has been made as to man's utilization of the tools which the Creator has placed at his disposal. The future is bright with promise if we make full and proper use of our tremendous assets and opportunities and vision the "glorious whole."




