VISITORS TREATED ROUGH AT LYMAN

To the Editor, Concrete Herald

Dear Sir:

During July we spent a very enjoyable vacation in Washington. Among the places we visited was your beautiful Skagit Valley, where we renewed friendships of yesterday.

We have always considered the people of Concrete and district among the friendliest in the world. We still do. In most respects our holiday was perfect. We had one experience, however, which detracted somewhat from our enjoyment.

As you know, Mr. Editor, the highway from Seattle passes within the "city limits" of a certain town. Here, we missed seeing a sign, failed to slow down, were apprehended by the town Marshal and fined twenty-five dollars.

My husband, who has been driving for thirty-five years, has never had an accident. He drives according to conditions. If children are playing near the highway, he slows down regardless of the speed limit. I realize that traffic rules are made for the good of the majority and that we were in the wrong. I do not resent the marshal's action in stopping us. What I do resent is his manner of approach.

He treated us as though we were fugitives from a chain-gang and not visitors from a friendly country. We had taught our children to respect the police, to consider them friends and to seek their help in any emergency. After this experience Allan, our five year-old son, doubts the advisability of making friends with the police. When this officer had spoken to us Allan said, "Mommy, why is that policeman mad at us?" When the officer turned around Allan continued: "Look! He has guns, I hope he doesn't shoot us."

In Canada foreign visitors are warned in case of a traffic violation. This officer may feel duty bound to fine every traffic violator but must have such a stern and menacing manner?

We hope to visit Concrete and the Skagit valley in the future. In the meantime it is our fervent wish that the highway may be changed so that we may avoid any possible contact with this town and its grim-visaged marshal.

Low Vote Kills Bonds

Tuesday's primary election, freely predicted to set new low records for voting, came up to full expectations with the result that although the county voted 2½ to 1 for the important Bridge Bonds, not enough votes were cast to make the approval legal.

The upper valley went all-out for the bridge bonds with very few votes cast against them. Sauk had 18 votes for, none opposed. Concrete voted 143 for, 20 against.

Will Try General Election

In view of the favorable vote, however, the county commissioners moved swiftly yesterday to put the machinery in motion for presenting the proposition again at the November general election, at which time a larger vote is anticipated.

In the few contests on the primary ballot there were no upsets. Don Magnuson (D) and Al Canwell (R) won nominations as Congressman-at-large; Jack Westland (R) drew a big majority for his re-nomination and Harry Henson (D) had no difficulty on the Democratic ticket. Harold Hinshaw won his re-nomination over Fred Frant (R), by a good margin.

Among the unopposed candidates, A. B. Wiseman, county commissioner from this district, got a grand vote of confidence by leading the ticket in almost every precinct.

Concrete managed to get out 163 votes in the three precincts—99 in West precinct; 84 in the East and 80 in the new Baker Precinct. There was no set pattern of party, the voters favoring Magnuson (D) 115 over Canwell's (R) 84 yet going 141 for Westland (R) and only 48 for Henson (D).

On the legislative ticket James Ovensell naturally led the ticket with 194. Don Eldridge was second with 141 and Emma Ridgway (D) was just above Russell (R) with 128 votes over 100 for third high.

The test between Deierlein (R) and Stiles (D) for prosecutor was close, 132 for Deierlein to 111 for Stiles. On the sheriff vote Hinshaw won 132 votes to 61 for his opponent, Fred Grant.
