### Bob Muller Home


Robert Muller of Van Horn was home again yesterday after being in the Memorial hospital since last Wednesday morning. Bob suffered a mild heart attack.

### Work On Road Up Thunder

#### Hallowe'en Party For Kids Set For Oct. 31

Everything is all set again for the annual Kid's Hallowe'en Party in which the American Legion and local businessmen combine resources to provide a full evening of fun for the children of the valley. The date for the party will be Wednesday, October 31st, starting at 7:00 in the evening.

A prize costume parade will start off the program. First, second and third prizes will be given each division. These include Witches, Ghosts and Spooky, Funny, Story Book, Clowns, Animals and Miscellaneous. First prize is \$1.00.

Parade entrants will gather in the school to be assigned their classifications and numbers, then will parade at the gym at 7:30. A movie program will follow and at the close cider and hot dogs will be served in the cafeteria.

### MARBLEMOUNT P. T. A. HEARS HIGHWAY MAN

Mr. Beck, assistant engineer of the state highway department, substituted for Director Wm. Bugge at the meeting of the Marblemount P. T. A. last Monday night. A representative of the department had been asked to talk over the dangerous situation in the slide area above the highway near Rockport.

Mr. Beck assured the members that everything possible is being done by the maintenance crew to control the sliding rocks. He stated that the plan now is to leave the large rocks in such a position that the smaller ones will fall into a reservoir behind, and that this will be cleaned out periodically.

The parents of children riding the school busses by the slide twice each day had become alarmed over the danger. It was felt that some immediate steps should be taken before wet weather and frost made the slide even more active.

Engineer Beck revealed that he was no stranger to the valley, having served as engineer on the Cascade highway road at Marble Creek twenty-three years ago when Strong & McDonald had the road contract.

After the speaker, the balance of the meeting was turned over to Mr. McIntire of the Upper Skagit Valley School District, who explained the need for additional class rooms and busses, and why the directors have asked for a bond issue to provide needed funds.

### Whatcom Fights Forest Cash Split

Whatcom county commissioners sat in the hot seat this week as they worked to pacify irate school officials over the division of the national forest timber money that is coming to that county from the logging activity around the Baker River reservoir. The problem is the split of the funds, which are earmarked for "roads and schools." A 50-50 split had been promised, then it was found that in order to keep the timber coming out, there would have to be some expenditures on the roads.

Last year Whatcom received over \$300,000 as their share. Half went to the schools, half for road purposes.

This year Commissioner Haxton told the group that they were up against it for money for work on the Baker Lake road and would have to take some of the forest money "off the top" before a split is made.

In the past few years very little has been done in maintenance on the Baker Lake road, which was originally built by the Bureau of Public Roads. What little work has been done has been mostly grading accomplished through an agreement with Skagit county. There is no access to the road except thru Skagit county.

The increased traffic has made it imperative that definite plans to maintain the road be prepared. Thus the dilemma of the Whatcom county board.

### Seattle Couple Hurt As Car Goes Off Bridge

Mr. and Mrs. George Allen of Seattle were treated at the hospital Tuesday night after suffering minor injuries in a car accident north of Bacon Creek on the Newhalem highway.

The accident occurred about 8:30 in the evening when their car went through a guard rail on the Bacon Creek bridge and dropped about 25 feet to the creek bed. The car hit on its nose, rolled over onto the top with an estimated damage of over \$2,000.

The Allens suffered minor cuts and bruises.

### Oak Harbor B Team Wins Game Monday

A heavy rain storm spoiled the crowd for the B Team game on Monday night, but the game was played with all the vigor the two teams could muster. Oak Harbor came out on top 30 to 7.

Jimmy Pinkey scored the lone touchdown for Concrete on an intercepted pass.

### Lions Trim Falls 26-0

A fighting bunch of Granite Falls athletes slowed down a Lion attack last Friday night at Granite Falls, holding the local team to a 6-0 score at halftime in their Tri-County league game. But after the rest period, Concrete came back to roll up another 20 points for a very satisfactory victory.

The first score came in the second quarter after the team had been on the goal line twice before only to have fumbles upset scoring chances. Tom Boury dove over for the touchdown.

In the second half it was Bob Sullivan's show as he began to get the feel of the Granite Falls defenses and started ambling through the holes. He romped to two touchdowns besides running up considerable yardage between goals.

To end the scoring for the evening Boury tossed a pass to Floyd Batt, who stepped into pay dirt.

Granite Falls had a rough evening, showing little offensive power and spending most of their time trying to stave off attacks on their goal line by the roaring Lions.

Darrel Pressentin turned in a fine performance and reeled out the longest run of the game.

### Homecoming Game Friday

Tomorrow night (Friday) the Concrete team will play host to Langley for the annual Homecoming game. In addition to the usual Homecoming activities, the Lions will have to find some way to take a strong Langley team into camp.

Their season's record so far includes four wins: 33 to 6 over LaConner 12 to 7 over Everett "B"; 33 to 0 over Granite Falls and 18 to 7 over Sultan.

All this adds up to trouble for the Lions. Some measure of hope for a better showing lies in the fact that Dick Rathvon will be back in the line up. He has been out for several weeks with an ankle injury.

The regular team has come thru the past few games in good shape and will be raring to go.

### School Issues Being Discussed

A series of meetings in all areas of the Upper Skagit Valley School District are now under way to discuss the proposed building program and the need for additional transportation equipment for the schools. The school board is asking the voters to authorize a \$200,000 bond issue for buildings and a \$25,000 levy for school busses at the coming General Election on November 6th.

The meeting at Marblemount was held Monday night at their regular P. T. A. session and the same procedure will be followed with the meeting at Rockport tonight.

The third meeting will be at the Birdsview Grange Hall this coming Monday at 8:00 p. m. and the fourth meeting will be held at the Concrete grade school on Tuesday evening, Oct. 23rd at 8:00.

### Building Needs Listed

The \$200,000 bond issue will allow for an additional room at Marblemount grade school, along with storage facilities and an addition to the heating plant. The estimated cost totalled \$33,230.

At Concrete the plan calls for four new classrooms at the high school at a cost of \$66,000, plus storage and toilet facilities of some \$13,500 for a total of \$79,500.

The plan is also to spend about \$64,500 on an addition to the shop at the high school, to include classes of metal and machine work.

The final building money would be \$19,600 for a bus garage for the district. This would allow the busses to be moved from the present small building on Main Street to a new building near the high school.

The school board expects to receive help again from Seattle City Light, in which case the extra funds could be used for equipment for the new buildings.

The extra five-mill levy is to provide a new and larger bus for the Rockport, Van Horn to Concrete run and a small bus for the Burpee Hill run.

In the first place election of a president receives far more importance than it warrants. Congress is the law-making, governing body, from which the president receives his powers. His election only vaguely dictates the policies the people expect under his administration. Yet to hear the politicians, you'd think he was being chosen dictator and actually would have the power to do anything he desired in the way of fulfilling campaign promises. He, alone, can do little. Our presidential elections are bad for the reason that criticism, personal and otherwise, is so blatant that it tends to tear down all respect for our candidates, our governmental processes, our very basis of law. The wonder of it is that we emerge as well after being subjected to twin campaigns of doubt and distrust. At the close of a very prosperous peace-time interval in which employment is at an all-time high and wages are the same, we are asked to believe that the government of a Democratic congress and a Republican administration has ruined our nation. The Democrats tell this on themselves. On the other hand the Republicans are fighting to prove that in spite of being hampered by an unfriendly congress, definite strides have been taken toward a sound economy after twelve years of varied experimenting. It would seem we were on the right track with our president. What needs to be done in November is to select a congress more inclined to judge our problems on merit rather than political advantage.

Along with the political "musts" for November should be removing the Wanamaker machine from the control of our schools. They've been used too long now for political purposes.

In our mania for speed, many men get the title of "fastest human". The sad thing is that it is also about the most fleeting title. You lose it or die trying to hold it.






