Drift On Baker May Stop Races

The big feature, the regatta of the Northwest Stock Outboard Assn., has been placed in jeopardy by the raising of Baker Lake last week, which flooded the water with driftwood again. Efforts will be made to have the lake swept clear before celebration time.

With just a little over a month to go, Cascade Days for 1961 got into full swing last Thursday night at the joint meeting of the American Legion and representatives of other local organizations. This year the carnival will have the home-town theme, with local groups handling all prize games. The only outside concessions will be rides, which are to be under supervision of the celebration committee.

Signing up for various games were Fire Department, Big Panda wheel, Little League, Baseball throw, Summer Recreation Com., Ping pong game, Fireman's Auxiliary, candy cotton and sno-cones. The Eagles will have a bingo stand. Nine games have been secured, so there are a few yet unsecured.

For food the Eagles Auxiliary is planning to serve hamburgers and other food in their basement hall. The Legion will hold a barbeque at Baker Lake during the boat races and the Legion Auxiliary plans a hot dog and pop stand.

Celebration Attractions

The program is shaping up with all events apparently coming. Not yet heard from are Go-Cart Assn. and the Motorcycle Hill Climb. As a special feature Diane Tingley and her horses from Sedro-Woolley will perform Sunday evening at the high school field, where the final Cascade Days drawing and fireworks will wind up the show.

Music for this year's parade has been assured with promise of the Bellingham Band, the Sedro-Woolley Drum & Bugle Corps, the Clown Band and the Concrete Band.

Forest Service Office Moves This Weekend

The Baker River Ranger District headquarters, now in the State Bank building, will be moved on Friday, July 14th to its new office building 4 1/2 miles west of Concrete, according to M. F. Barber, District Ranger. The new office will be open for business on Monday morning. An open house will be scheduled and announced at a later date.

The new site was purchased last year and construction of the office and one dwelling was started early this spring. Several more houses and service buildings will be built later on.

New Office Scheduled For Marblemount F. S.

Bids for construction of an office and sanitary system at the Marblemount Ranger Station have been called, the local Forest Service office said today.

The structure will be a 72 by 24-foot single story building and a pre-bid conference with prospective bidders will be held at the site of construction.

The pre-bid conference is scheduled for July 11 at 1 p.m. with bids to be opened July 28 in the Regional Forest Service office at Portland.

Work on the structure must begin 10 days after notice of bid acceptance and is to be complete in 120 days.

Glacier Man Drowned In Ross Lake Accident

David Stromme, 44, of Glacier, drowned Tuesday evening while on a fishing trip on Ross Lake. The accident occurred near Jack Point, after he and Charles Graham, also of Glacier, left Hoquiam Camp to head for Little Beaver, about eight miles down the lake. The drowning occurred about 10:00 P. M.

No details have been learned except that Graham was unable to rescue Stromme from the water at the time. Skin divers are trying to locate the body.

Council Asked For Approval Of Shake Mill In Central Concrete

Dave and Knox Phillips, representing the Phillips shake mill, were at the council meeting Monday evening to ask permission of the council to purchase the old Wally Warm Lumber Yard property for a mill site.

As the location is on Main street and in the central part of town, there is a problem of causing a raise in insurance costs to nearby homes and business places. Mayor Peterson asked that the Phillips' get a report from their insurance company on the possible effect the erection of a mill would have on such rates.

As a further investigation of the request, Mayor Peterson and Councilman Solomon will get the feelings of area residents and business houses before making any commitment for the council.

Council May Get Help On Arterial Planning

The town council, faced with the necessity of making up a comprehensive "six-year plan" of improvement of local arterial highways to connect with the state highway, had a call Monday evening by an engineer of Harstead Engineering of Seattle, who are making such surveys and plans for small towns.

The outcome of the interview was that the company will submit an outline of such a plan and the cost, after which the council will decide what to do.

Under a law passed by the last legislature the town will receive 1/2c in additional gas tax revenue on a per-capita basis, but the fund may be spent only for arterial streets, and only after meeting required preliminary steps. The final approval of any project rests with the state district highway engineer.

The town received the first payment of \$182.90 this month. When computed on a full yearly basis the tax is expected to bring around \$1,800.

The council hopes to get the plan approved in time to use the new fund on the paving of Superior Avenue from the 17-A intersection to the Baker Lake road.

City Light Wins Okay On Boundary Project

Seattle City Light this week received the go-ahead on Boundary Dam on the Pend Oreille River in Eastern Washington. The \$125 million dollar project will increase the city's power to 600,000 kw. The new dam is expected to produce an additional 540,000 kw.

The project had been held up pending hearing of the Power Commission and protest by the P.U.D. and mining interests.

Robert E. Brown, who was project manager on the Gorge Dam on the Skagit, will hold the same position on the new dam.
