Mt. Vernon Logger Gets Newhalem Flat Sale

UNION CLAIMS PUNITIVE DRIVE BEAT WISEMAN

Voters of the county and especially of the Third Commissioners District will probably be astounded to hear that the defeat of Brown Wiseman, veteran commissioner of this district, was not a whim of election-time choice—but the result of a secretly planned and executed campaign by Local 176, American Federation Employees, who now claim the defeat of Mr. Wiseman as a "stunning upset victory" by their group.

No public mention was made of the union issue during either the primary or general campaign and it was only after election that the union publications proclaimed the news that they had participated in financing and directing the underground campaign.

Here is the full story from the A. F. S. C. M. E. "News and Views" of November, 1962, Vol. II, No. 3 for County and City Employees:

"UNION WINS POLITICAL BATTLE"

"The organized labor movement in general and Local 176, Skagit County Road Department Employees, in particular, won a stunning upset victory on Tuesday, November 6, when the voters of Skagit County elected a new county commissioner.

Claude Wilson, a newcomer to politics, defeated Brown Wiseman, the well-known incumbent commissioner of some fourteen years, for the position of Skagit County Commissioner from the Third District. Wiseman, a publicly avowed enemy of our union, reportedly stated on numerous occasions before and during the campaign that

if he was re-elected he would do everything he could to break up the local union of county and road department employees. The local union has a signed, written labor agreement with the two other county commissioners, but Wiseman has refused to sign. In fact, Wiseman would leave the room when the matter was brought up for discussion.

Wilson, on the other hand, stated that if he were elected, he would work closely with the other two commissioners, Scott Richards and Joy Busha, and would certainly go along with and sign the labor agreement.

Early in the political campaign, the officers and members of Local 176 made a decision to go all out to defeat Commissioner Wiseman. They requested financial assistance from our State Council, and their request was approved by the State Council Executive Board. In addition, Council Staff Representative Larry McKibban was assigned to spend as much time as was needed in the area. The Washington Federation of State Employees, Council 28, cooperated by furnishing a mailing list of their membership in the area, and a special letter was sent to these people. The local union received considerable assistance from the Central Labor Council and organized labor's political organization, C.O.P.E.

The over-all labor effort consisted of financial contributions to the campaign, the paying for and distribution of over 10,000 sample ballots, and lots of worn shoe leather in personal door-to-door contacts on behalf of the labor-supported candidate, Claude Wilson.

This latest victory is just one of the long list of accomplishments for Local 176 and our State Council. The local was first chartered in April of 1959. With Commissioner Wiseman's statement that he would never allow a union in his district and his threats of firing anyone who joined, the local had difficulty in building membership. However, with the cooperation of the Commissioners Richards and Busha, the local did organize in their road districts, and in August, 1961, a written labor agreement was signed between these two commissioners and the union. The labor agreement, besides providing for a grievance procedure, seniority, and other working condition provisions, also provides for sixty days' accrued sick leave (before they had none), ten paid holidays (before, they had none), and raised vacation from two weeks to three weeks after five years' service. A wage boost was also won during this time."

The issue also carried a photo of newly elected Commissioner Claude Wilson; Joy Busha, Chairman of the Board of Skagit County Commissioners, and Jim Leckenby, President of Local 176, taken at an open house sponsored by Local 176 on election night.

NO UNION ISSUE

The strange thing about the campaign and vindictive statements directed at Wiseman in the article is that there was no union issue at stake. The county has had a labor agreement with the union since August of 1961. Before that the board had approximated both scale

Sewer Grant To Be Requested

The Town of Concrete's application for a federal grant under the Accelerated Public Works Program is expected to be on its way to the agency in charge by the end of this month. This action was made possible Monday night by the town council which passed a series of resolutions clearing away the legal requirements necessary to approve the action.

In effect the first four resolutions passed made formal application for both state and federal agency funds, designated the mayor as official representative of the council in furnishing necessary details and information as requested by the agencies, and setting up a provision for an increase in the town budget for capital improvement should the grant be made and the sewer project embarked upon.

The final paper was a contract with Harstad Associates, engineering firm handling the application, setting forth all details of what services they will furnish and the rates for such services. All that the contract specified at this time was an agreement to use the services of the company if and when the sewer project is approved.

Next step will be to secure a bonding house recommendation as feasibility of revenue bond financing and then the town will be set to await the final decision by the government agency. Walter Banks, Hanstad representative, pointed out once more that there is no certainty that a grant will be made or any guarantee that a decision would be announced at any specified time.

The application will be complete and sent in by the end of the month. After that the town can do no more than await developments.

No-So-Hot Time In The Old Town Hall Recently

Most of Monday evening's long council session was taken up with sewer grant application details, but before adjourning the council had time to pay a long list of bills to close out 1962 and do a bit of business for 1963.

A huge bill for furnace repair brought protests by council members and as part of the cost was in several cleaning jobs on the burning mechanism they voted to replace the old, rusty storage tank with a new one in hopes this would cut down maintenance. The furnace has never been satisfactory since installation, they reported, and repairs have now more than surpassed the original cost.

To close a deal made last year the council approved payment of \$2,000 for the Everett building on Baker Street which has served as town equipment garage for many years. Rental has been \$15 per month.

The mayor reported that Town Marshal Fred Bianchini had taken the county sheriff's office exam but as yet had given no notice of intention to leave the force here.

A request for Concrete's stand on parking meters was requested by the town of Winlock. The council agreed that to need parking meters you must first have a lack of parking space and the local problem is not enough cars, rather than not enough curb space.

A bill for a portable radio for the fire department was held up on word that the equipment had not been found completely satisfactory by the department.

Action on a Peddler's Ordinance was deferred until the next meeting due to the late hour. Also to be discussed next session will be an ordinance making it a misdemeanor for a person under age to seek to purchase liquor.

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Most time elections are to be noted and forgotten but exception must be made when subsequent facts prove that the voters have been swindled. This is the case in the commissioner's race in the general election. A quiet but intensive drive, admittedly planned and executed with as little public knowledge as possible has resulted in an also admitted reprisal against a public servant who did not bow to wishes of the group conducting the vicious attack. The fact that there was little actual basis for the reprisal and much dishonesty in its endeavor is beside the point. What matters is that it was accomplished without the public being aware that the touted "new" candidate was merely a vehicle for political revenge. It also matters that the county can not help but suffer from the results in a great many ways. Will judges have to guard their decisions from possible offense to organized groups? Can a sheriff make an arrest in a case involving a member? They, too, are elective and therefore vulnerable to reprisal. How soon will the taxpayer begin to pay the obligations incurred by those favored by campaign funds and promotion? And how long will they continue to pay? In our minds the conception of democracy in county government has been dealt a crushing blow. For the first time motives become suspect in a place where free action must be the rule if true public interest is to be served. Past history has shown that many men who go into office under obligation do so with half their effectiveness already destroyed and soon find the least implied suggestion becomes a galling badge of inadequacy from which there is no escape. Skagit county is in for troubled times.

and benefits of other counties in the state, with six paid holidays, social security and retirement program and fully paid medical aid. On July 31, 1961, Commissioners Busha and Richards brought up the agreement for the first time and signed it immediately without formal discussion, saying that they had already approved it and had promised it signed that day. Mr. Wiseman declined to sign without study of the agreement.

In a statement from Mr. Wiseman, he reports that since that time there had been no discussion of the agreement or any contact with union officials at the board meetings, nor has he made any statements against the union. He says it is a matter of record that no wage boost was received in the agreement and that the only actual change was granting of four more paid holidays, most of which are not authorized in similar work.

The article in the union publication has been given statewide circulation among union members but did not appear in any papers available to the general public. It was only after a few copies found their way into other hands that the "great victory" became known by those who "lost."

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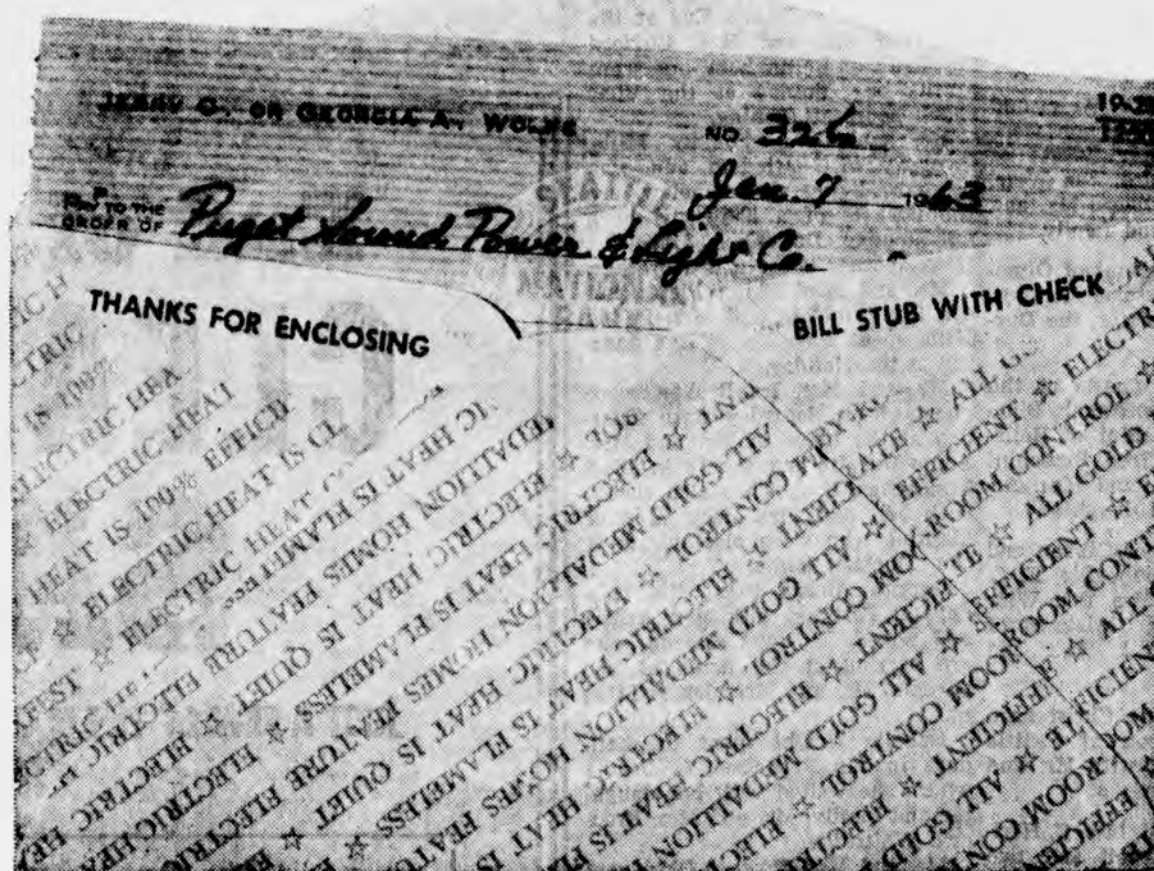
