\section*{Paycheck for a 175-hour work week!}

The average home in Puget Power country uses nearly 175 kilowatt-hours of electric service each week However, a "kilowatt-hour" is simply a measurement of electricity. To give you some idea of how much work one kilowatt-hour does, consider this: One kilo watt-hour operates a vacuum cleaner for two hours or a TV for four hours or a refrigerator for 18 hours.
