Baker Lake was not too productive, being nearly 20 feet below normal level. According to Game Department checks, 35 fishermen caught 171 silvers. Puget ermen caught 171 silvers. Puget Power officials say that, based on the rate of flow into the lake and projected need of water, the lake will be full by the middle of next month, May 15 to 20.

#### **Federal Funds Return** To Local School District


Payment of \$6,770 in federal impact school aid to the Concrete school district will be received scoon. The federal funds pay part of the cost of educating children
