City Light Plans To Raise Ross

Seattle City Light is planning a \$41 million expansion of Ross Dam which would see the lake raised 125 feet, according to an announcement by John Nelson, City Light superintendent.

The Ross Lake expansion is planned in an effort to meet the growing power needs of Seattle. If the project is approved by the Federal Power Commission, the construction could be finished in 1973. Approximately 30 per cent construction could be missied in 1973. Approximately 30 per cent additional power would be creat-ed by the Ross Powerhouse. The proposed diversion of Thunder Creek and the damming

Copper Creek have been put aside temporarily.

Preliminary work has already been done on the Thunder Creek dam proposal which would run its waters through a five-mile-long tunnel into Ross Lake, diver-ting its flow from Diablo Lake. Thunder Creek water then would run through the Ross Lake power-house before entering Diablo

City Light, however, says it is not ready to file an application with the commission for permission on the Thunder Creek pro-

The Copper Creek project is still in analysis stages.
