A diver, Ray Sunblad, attached A diver, ray sundad, attached to the Forest Service's Baker River-District, found the bodies of Timothy John Glover, 4, and his sister Penelope, 6, in 10 to 12 feet of water about five feet offshore just north of the Tarr's Perent head deals cherit, effor the Resort boat dock shortly after the children were reported missing on Friday afternoon.

Search for the children was spearheaded and organized by Jim Menzies of Concrete who is working for the Forest Service during the summer. He was at the Boulder Creek campground when the report of the missing children came over the radio about 2:30 o'clock. He immediately went to the resort where the Glover family had rented a cabin for the holiday weekend. Do Jenson of the Koma Kulshan st tion started a patrol of the lake by boat checking the water and the steep banks along the resort.

By the time Bill Knechtel, district ranger, arrived with Sunblad about half an hour later, Menzies had pinpointed the area in which he thought the search should be concentrated. Sunblad discover-ed the bodies within seconds.

The father of the children said that they had last been seen around 9:45 o'clock that morning and that they had been warne not to play near the steep banks. However, they apparently disre-garded the warning and either both fell in sliding down the
