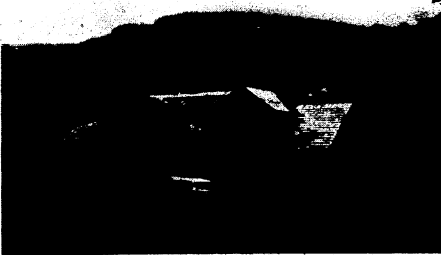

A NEW BUSINESS BUILDING AT ROCKY CREEK

A substantial addition to the growing business center at Rocky Creek, above Rockport, is this new building under construction by Ray Wine. It will house Mrs. Beulah Wine's beauty shop, now in their home, plus a modern laundromat, office space for an eventual over-night, trailer park

Mrs. Adrienne Nelles Seriously Injured In Car Accident

Adrienne Nelles, wife of Grant Nelles, Concrete, is in the Everett Hospital under intensive care for injuries received in a two-car collision last Friday evening.

Mrs. Nelles was taken to the Skagit Valley Hospital immediately following the accident and was operated on that night to repair the damage to one of her eyes. The sight of the eye will not be impaired, according to last reports. She also received a severe concussion, for which she is now under observation at the Everett Hospital where she was moved Sunday. In addition, she has a broken collar bone, cracked ribs, and lacerations about the head and face.

The accident occurred about 7:45 p.m. Friday at the intersection of the Avon-Allen Road and Highway 20.

According to the Washington State Patrol report, the car driven by Mrs. Nelles failed to stop at a stop sign and ran into the right side of the car driven by Jack Webb of Anacortes, which was going east on Highway 20.

Passengers in the Webb car were Mrs. Webb, Mr. and Mrs. Howard Maxwell, Mr. and Mrs. Edward Deaton, all of Anacortes. All received lacerations and injuries. Mrs. Deaton was taken to the Skagit Valley Hospital and Mrs. Webb and the Maxwells to the Island Hospital.

Both cars were said to be completely totalled.

Herb Larsen Files For Mayor

Two nominees will be on the November 4 ballot in the race for mayor of the city of Concrete. Herbert Larsen filed for the position before the deadline date last Friday. He and Margaret Stadlman, incumbent, are the only candidates for the mayoral position.

Larsen of Larsen & Howard Bookkeeping and Tax Service previously served as a member of the city council.

Bob Sjoboen, incumbent, and Fred Bianchini are the only candidates for the two open council positions. Sjoboen filed for Position 1 and Bianchini for Position 2.

Registration books will close October 3 for new residents to register, or others to change addresses, in order to vote in the November 4 election.

Five Candidates File For School Board

There will be two contests for open positions on the school board of Upper Skagit School District No. 102 in the special election to be held in conjunction with the November 4 general election.

Bonney Boyd, incumbent, and Sue Coffell will be on the ballot for District No. 3 representing Central Concrete. Ray Buchanan and Robert Bangert have filed for Position No. 4, Rockport. Buchanan is filling out the unexpired term of Lawrence Hornbeck.

Kenneth Balzar, incumbent, is the only candidate for District No. 1, Birdsvew.

Lions Match Meridian 6 To 6

The Concrete Lions' first Whatcom County league football game ended in a 6-6 tie at Meridian last Friday night before a contingent of home-town rooters who sat in a steady downpour to cheer on the school team.

A touchdown pass from Keith Pyatte to Tim Evans in the second period accounted for the Concrete score which tied the game. Neither team was able to hit pay dirt in the second half, mostly because of the sloppy field.

Meridian struck early in the game on a quick opener over left guard for 27 yards. That was Meridian's last serious threat. Concrete's 44 stunting defense completely bottled up the Trojan attack for the rest of the game.

The Lion offense was plagued by five pass interceptions, penalties, and fumbles in the second half and couldn't capitalize on the outstanding play of the defense, said Coach Jim Menzies. Two Lion drives were halted inside the Meridian 20-yd. line. Meanwhile Meridian failed to penetrate Concrete territory the entire second half.

Planning For Baker Lake Area Discussed By Puget Power, State And Local Representatives

Representatives from the U. S. Forest Service, State Departments of Fisheries, Natural Resources, Parks and Recreation, U. S. Fish & Wildlife Service, county and local government met Monday evening at the Puget Power lodge at Baker Lake to discuss the future plans for the Baker River valley.

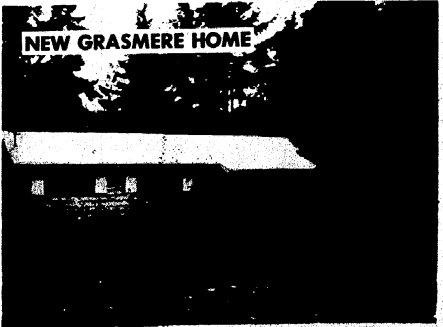
Ralph M. Davis, president of the power company, had arranged the session to consolidate thinking of all agencies on proposed developments now planned by the Puget Power company.

The company's program, outlined in detail for the group, listed a five-point program which included work now being carried

out privately. These included the clearing of Lake Shannon; stocking of Baker Lake with rainbow trout; setting up public access to both lakes with boat launching facilities and park areas; study on a proposed ski lodge development in Schreiber's Meadow; setting up of tourist information centers at Concrete and at Baker Lake; the new Glover Mountain Overlook trails and road (the 1,200 foot hill north of the upper Baker dam) and the recently completed airport improvement here.
