# Ross Lake Opening For Fishing Sunday

Opening day of fishing at Ross Lake is this coming Sunday, June 21, when hundreds of fishermen are expected to come from both the south end by way of Seattle City Light facilities or from the north end of the lake by way of Canada to try their luck.

City Light provides fishermen with free parking space at Diablo and provides boat transportation between Diablo and Ross Dam at a charge of 50 cents ech way. The boat leaves Diablo for Ross daily, at .8:45 a.m. and 2:45 p.m. and makes the return trip at 9:15 a.m. and 3:15 p.m.

A special early boat for fishermen will be operated on Saturdays only, beginning June 27 and continuing through September 5. The early boat will leave Diablo at 7:30 a.m. and return from Ross at 8 a.m.

Diablo and Gorge Lakes have been open since April 19. The fishing season at all three lakes ends October 31. town growth. Committees will be named by Chairman Ray Drake Jr. to head up action on the main items for to wn improvement. He will choose seven directors to work with the Action Committee's officers as a steering group.

C. M. Dwelley was appointed vice chairman to serve on the board. Other appointees will be named by the next meeting.

Regular meetings will be held the second and fourth Wednesdays of each month at 7:30 p.m. in the City Hall, All meetings are open to the public.
