## 1970 Nose Count Low For Concrete

Concrete is among the cities and towns of the state wonder-ing what happened in the recent census that population declined instead of increased. The official count shows Concrete with a loss of 282 resident in the past ten years. The drop was from 840 down to 558. In a like manner losses were reported in LaConner (1) down to 637; Ham-

nation (8), down to so; namiton (8), down to 195.

Mount Vernon is now the biggest city with a total of 8,532, over Anacortes which lost 837 residents and now is given just 7,577. Sedro-Woolley picked up 816 residents and is now listed at 4,521. Burlington gained 112

at 4,521. Burington gained 112 to register at 3,000.

As a whole Skagit county lost on the count, dropping from 52,-200 to 51,146, while the number of households gained from 16,-500 to 17,000. In the same period estimated retail sales dropped about a million dollars and estimated buying income was up \$12½ million.

Food and automobiles are the

top retail sales figures, around \$20 million each with food hav-ing just a slight edge.
