Another boost for early com-pletion of the North Cross-State Highway came last week when the State Highway Commission approved another \$1 million for paving on a section of the highway ahead of schedule.

The plans is to call for bids on paving of nine miles of the high-way between Granite Creek crossing and Rainy Pass, which is on this side of the mountain toward Ross Lake. The estimate set by the engineers is \$1,082,500. The money is to come from U. S. Forest Highway funds.

Contractors will be working on oth sides of the mountains this coming year, both on paving and new bridges, leaving only a few contracts left before the highway I be ready for traffic.
All the activity in trying to

get the highway completed is part of the program to open up the area now covered by the North Cascade National Park. The goal for opening of the highway is now 1972


