Show Tickets Now On Sale

The Concrete High School Y-nica staff announced today that advance tickets for the December 9 International Show will be available at places of convenience throughout the area.

Rubella Clinic Here On Sunday

This Sunday (November 22) is the date for the Free Rubella Clinic scheduled at Concrete High School from noon until 4 p.m.

The goal is to immunize all children between the ages of one and 12 against Rubella, commonly called three-day or German measles, to prevent a predicted epidemic next spring. Doctors says the disease appears on a six to nine year cycle and the last epidemic was in 1964-65.

Coordinator for the Concrete area is Mrs. Gerald Wood.

Drivers Unhurt In Two Crashes

Both drivers escaped injury in separate, single-car accidents Saturday on Highway 20.

The Washington State Patrol reports Roger L. Dickinson, 20, of Route 1, Concrete, swerved to avoid three horses standing on the highway 10 miles east of Sedro Woolley. His 1965 hard-top went into a ditch and rolled over. Damage to the car was estimated at \$400.

James Feddema, 17, of Route 1, Sedro Woolley side-swiped a utility pole when his car went off the roadway 1.5 miles east of Sedro Woolley. Damage to his 1967 small sedan was estimated at \$500.

Christmas Mailing Deadline Is Near

Christmas mailing deadlines were announced this week by Concrete Postmaster Ed Pulfice.

To assure delivery by Christmas packages to distant states should be mailed by December 1 and via surface mail to Alaska and Hawaii by November 30. Surface mail to Canada and Mexico should be underway by December 4.

The postmaster urges use of zip code both in the mailing and return addresses on all parcels and greeting cards.

Police Complete 16-Hour Course

Concrete Police Chief Dale Woodruff and Patrolman Lyle Thorp have successfully completed a 16-hour breathalyzer course. The classes at the State Patrol Academy in Shelton cover methods of operating the machine that tests percentage of alcohol, the laws governing its use where drunkenness is suspected and court procedure.

Nation's Largest Spruce Found In North Cascades National Park

The Nation's largest Engelmann Spruce, as measured by the American Forestry Association system, was discovered in North Cascades National Park this past summer, announced Park Superintendent Roger J. Contor.

The record tree measured 25.6 feet in circumference, 230 feet in height and has a 49-foot crown spread. It surpasses the previous record tree in Olympic National Park by 77 points under the system applied by the American Forestry Association.

Dr. Grant Sharpe, George Douglas and Richard Costello of the University of Washington found the giant spruce in the Chilliwack River Valley near the Canadian border while conducting some general vegetation surveys of that part of the park.

It is quite possible that other rare and unusual things will be found in the new park as it becomes better known, Contor said. Among this past summer's other interesting observations,

was the sighting of a wolverine near Egg Lake on Copper Ridge. Wolverines are very rare in Washington.

State Timber Sale Slated

Sale of 3.1 million board feet of timber, appraised at \$23,075 and located about 18 miles south of Sedro Woolley is scheduled December 28 at the Sedro Woolley District office of the State Department of Natural Resources.

The sale is one of 19 announced this week by Bert L. Cole, commissioner of public lands. The total, 56,320,000 board feet, is valued at \$976,847. In addition to Skagit, December sales are scheduled in Chelan, Clallam, Ferry, Jefferson, Kitsap, Klickitat, Lewis, Pend Oreille, Stevens, Thurston, Wahkiakum and Mason Counties.
