A special meeting to explain the new Open Space Taxation Act is scheduled in Concrete December 14.

Jack Crawford, county extension agent, will present a slide and tape program in the high school beginning at 8 p.m. It is planned to acquaint owners of farm and forest land with possible tax benefits to be gained under this program.

To qualify, the land must be in agricultural use, timber production or in some other open space use. If landowners use the Open Space Tax, they agree to

maintain the present use of the land for a minimum of ten vears

Purpose of the act is to allow assessors to value land on cur-rent use rather than market value. Landowners who qualify for and intend to use the open space designation must file an application with the county as-sessor before December 31.

Forms, instructions and rules overning registration of land governing registration of land are available at the assessors office and will be explained at the December 14 meeting here.

well.

Emphasis is being placed on the Darrington and Baker River Ranger Districts as the areas most needing Christmas tree removal. These districts have had few young trees removed in the past and increased cutting will benefit those trees left standing.

"The purpose of National For-est Christmas tree cutting is to provide a meaningful family winter outing. Trees removed will improve timber stands by allowing remaining trees more growing space as well as light and water."

Families are advised to come equipped with tire chains, warm clothing, good walking boots, a saw or axe, a shovel, rope, and a tarp to wrap the tree in for protection from wind damage.

The Darrington District will sell tree permits between the hours of 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. at the Ranger Station from December 1 through December 24. Cutting areas will vary with the snowline. Travel instructions and information will be available at the Station.
