Peterson Vows to Continue Battle to Preserve N.S.H.

Concrete's State Senator Low-Concrete's State Senator Low-ell Peterson has pledged to car-ry the battle to preserve North-ern State Hospital to the senate in an attempt to over-ride Gov-ernor Daniel J. Evans decision to close the institution along with four others in what the governor calls an economy move

Senator Peterson called on other Democratic legislators to inspect the various facilities faced with closure to ascertain true facts in each institution. "I cannot help but feel that Governor Evans has been ill

Governor Evans has been ill advised by his director of institutions, Dr. William R. Conte, particularly in closure of Northern State Hospital," Peterson said, "Dr. Conte's actions as far back as January of 1968 have indicated he held little support for Northern State.
"It is my feeling that if Dr. Conte has so mis-informed the governor on the operational picture of Northern State he may well have done the same to the

well have done the same to the other institutions involved." Senator Peterson continued. "If this is a case of the right hand not knowing what the left hand is doing, a full scale investigation is warranted."

Governor Evans announced Tuesday of this week that five institutions, including the state mental hospital in Sedro Woolley, will be closed July 1:

Although the governor has the power to cut funds or close institutions, the legislature could change the planned closures after it meets in January by providing funds to keep them open. If the legislature ignores the governor's request to close the hospital and establishes funds for its operation in the budget, the measure will go to Evans who then has the option of approving the budget as a whole or vetoing any individual item. Evans said he regretted that news of the impending closures leaked out last week after he had told legislators but before personnel of the institutions had been told. Evans said he decided on closure of Northern rather than Western State Hospital near Tacoma because Western

Skagit Chambers of Commerce are urging that all area residents write to the governor protesting his plan for the hospital closure here.
