# School To Use Old High Bldg.

Part of the old Concrete night school building will be used for classrooms this fall, according to a decision of the local Board of Education following-much thought and discussion on elementary school housing prob-

Two meetings on the pressing need for more classroom space were held during the last month with the Board and the new Concrete school superintendent, Fred Culbertson, deliberating on

possible solutions.

Decision to use the building was influenced by the need for a remedial room, an audio visual room, an inside play area for children in kindergarten through the fourth grade, and the difficulty involved in at-tempting to renovate parts of the grade school areas for class-

tne grade school areas for class-room and library use.

According to present plans, the library will be left in its former location. Grades five and six will be moved to the old high school building to open up two rooms, one for remedial work and one for audio visual use. This arrangement will leave the play area in the grade school available for the lower grades so that the smaller children will be under cover in bad weather, Superintendent Culbertson said, "It is to be understood that

said, "It is to be understood that this action is a stop-gap only and that discussions aimed at solving the growing building problems of the district will be held in the near future."

## Lightning Sets Many Fires In High Country Of Baker Forest

Lightning storms early last Saturday sparked 25 fires in the Mt. Baker National Forest, including to in the Skagit Dis-trict and eight in the Baker River District, which could have devastated acres of timber if they had not been brought under control through combined effort of Forest Service and local ground crews, smoke jumpers and private logging crews, Fif-teen of the fires were in the Glacier District.

Largest of the local area fires was at Maiden Lake in the Baker District, covering half an acre before it was controlled

All of the Baker blazes were out by Monday, said William Knechtel, district ranger, and the most stubborn fire in the Skagit District, the quarter-acre fire on Jack Mountain, was in the mop-up stage at press time and should be entirely exhausted by today, according to the Marblemount ranger station. Bryce Lausch heads this district as ranger.

#### 24 SMOKE JUMPERS

Twenty-four smoke jumpers were airlifted in from bases at were arritted in from bases at Winthrop, Wash, and Missoula, Mont. Some of the jumpers were dropped to help on four Baker District fires and both of the Skagit District fires. Nine Washington Logger employ-ees helped control fires on

Anderson Creek and two Forest Service men were flown in from the Darrington Ranger Station

the Darrington Hanger Station to assist three jumpers and three of the trail crew on the Jack Mt. fire, which started up about noon on Saturdáy.

The other fire in the Skagit District was on Upper Devil's Creek, burning about an eighth of an acre of small timber and brush

The Baker fires, all started by lightning strikes between 4:00 ngntning strikes between 4:00 and 5:30 a. m. Saturday morning, were one at the head of Nooksack River, one on Maiden Lake, one on Shuksan Creek; four between Lily Pad Lake and Anderson Lakes, and one on Walker Beach. Welker Peak.
